➤ **Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation**

Mayor Irwin led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Mayor Irwin called for a moment of silence in honor of the passing of Chairman Ronnie Lupe.

Council Member Dahnk led the Council and members of the public in the Lord's Prayer.

Mayor Irwin moved agenda item D.1 to the beginning of the meeting due to the kids and families in attendance for the recognition of the Blue Ridge High School Fab Lab Team. She stated that she is very proud of these young people and their accomplishments and recognized all of the hard work put in by their teacher Kevin Woolridge.

**D.1 Mayor's Proclamation - Recognition of Blue Ridge High School Fab Lab Team recipient of the Technology Challenge Award during the 25th Annual NASA Human Exploration Rover Challenge**

Mayor Irwin read the proclamation as follows:

*WHEREAS, it is the intention of the Mayor and Council of the Town of Pinetop-Lakeside to focus attention on noteworthy occasions and individuals; and*

*WHEREAS, tonight, the Mayor and Council wish to recognize and congratulate the Blue Ridge High School Fab Lab Team great accomplishment, recipient of the Technology Challenge Award; and*

*WHEREAS, the Blue Ridge High School was one of the almost 100 other high school, college and university teams from 24 States that competed, as well as several teams from other countries including Bangladesh, Bolivia, the Dominican Republic, Egypt, Ethiopia, Germany, Morocco and Peru; and*

*WHEREAS, even more impressive was that this was the team's first year competing in an event of this magnitude; and*

*WHEREAS, fourteen physics and engineering students from Blue Ridge High School built a rover with a tough chassis and a unique drive train which was*

*a winning entry in the 25<sup>th</sup> Annual NASA Human Exploration Rover Challenge, held on April 12 through 13, 2019 at the U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama; and*

*WHEREAS, the team utilized recycled fitness equipment from the high school's weight room for the rover's tires and wheels; and to keep costs down, a multitude of locally donated materials were used in their design; and*

*WHEREAS, the panel praised the students for their concepts and designs stating that they were doing university-level engineering design and fabrication. Their design far and away exceeded most of the university-level submissions; and*

*WHEREAS, their ingenious design earned them the top award from NASA for the Drive Train technology Challenge; and*

*NOW, THEREFORE, I, Stephanie Irwin, Mayor of the Town of Pinetop-Lakeside, do hereby formally congratulate the Blue Ridge Fab Lab Team in the Town of Pinetop-Lakeside and do urge all citizens to join with me and Council in congratulating Blue Ridge High School's fourteen physics and engineering students, teacher, parents and sponsors for achieving the Technology Challenge Award and in wishing their profound accomplishments and inspiring example of commitment to excellence.*

Mayor Irwin also recognized the Blue Ridge District Office, Fab Lab Physics and Engineering Club and especially teacher Kevin Woolridge.

## B. Call to the Public

Mayor Irwin called for public comments.

Ms. Kim Isom, 784 Pine Spruce Lane, Pinetop, offered the following comments:

*“I would like to revisit the events of August 1<sup>st</sup>, briefly if I could, that day we had the perfect storm, with the torrential down pour, the hail, the lack of maintenance to the drainage ditches and the culverts, really created quite a mess with lots of debris. With that said, I would be remiss if I did not say that we had all, my neighbors and I, we thank you for the things that are happening on Pinewood Lane, the ditches and culverts being addressed, and we do appreciate that. With that said, I want to say that as decision makers, which you all are, it is nice to fund those new projects, we like the new projects; however, with that said, I feel that maybe the existing infrastructure may be neglected. We are here to say that things are broken, as you know, and I want to specifically talk about, and all of my neighbors are devastated with the destruction that has happened. Pinewood Lane, once the ditches are done and completed, technically that is only step one. I do not know if any of you have been down Pine Spruce Lane, it runs parallel to Pine Branch, which was recently resurfaced. There has been some information and some misinformation and some miscommunication, but I will rattle off what I do know that has been happening. I believe a couple of years ago we actually received flyers on our doors that said we would be getting some restructuring of pavement, but we never heard anything that, I think that was approximately two to three summers ago. Well here is the thing we would like to see happen; can we please get the engineering redone on Pine Spruce. I know you are about to do the budget tonight, but maybe you could get the engineering done over there, have it drain properly, there is a culvert that needs to be cleaned out. If you could address these things in the meantime and possible revisit the budget and find a way to find some capital to get some movement on this, I would really appreciate it.”*

Mr. Jonathan Hanridge, 792 Pine Spruce, Pinetop, offered the following comments:

*“I live next door to the Isoms, in the same area and we have the same damage to our property and as someone who has been at the property for 18 years now, this is not the first time this has occurred, this is the second time, in 2004 the exact same thing happened. This year, unlike the last time, I had all of the water in the street coming at the foundation of my house, I had to hire a civil engineer to come out to my house and evaluate my property and what foundation damage I have.*

*My wife is not able to sleep very well, my son is wondering if our house is going to fall down. There is an emotional component that is affecting the people in this area because we do not have the city enforcing our neighbors blocking up bar ditches on their property to direct the water off the road into the proper drainages and instead it is coming directly down to our houses. The road has been terrible for years. We need this to not be three summers from now, we need an immediate solution to this problem, so we do not continue expenses and so we can try to protect our home values in this community.”*

Mr. Gene Irestone, 725 Pine Spruce, Pinetop, offered the following comments:

*“I am also here to talk about the same issues. I have met some of the staff members out there talking and walking our road regarding our drainage issues. We also sustained damage to our property, not only from flooding but from the hail itself. The road has diminished and Pine Spruce has diminished to a point now that I do not think it can even be called a road and we need some attention out there. Our property values are being diminished by this road and the non-care of the road. Everybody around us, the upper portions of the development have received resealing, the road to the left of us has been resurfaced, and I hear there are some engineering issues, which I understand, but we need to see something put on an agenda and talked about, we are neighbors talking to you. I invite all of you to come out, I will meet you there, come on out and take a look at our road and take a look at the mess. One other thing I would like to address is a comment I heard made about the drainage up on Whispering Pines that it was not sufficient enough to handle that type of storm, now that might be true, but on the other half of that, it has never been cleaned, or maintained, the culverts are plugged and it had no where else to go but to flow over the top and drain down to our property. So, on one side of it, it may not have been engineered right or properly when it was first put in, but it was never maintained properly either. Someone needs to step up to the plate and start helping us out. I thank you for your time.”*

Ms. Kay Tsouhlarakin, 748 Pine Spruce, Pinetop, offered the following comments:

*“My husband and I have lived here for eight years; we love our house and when we moved here, we knew the road was in bad condition, but we liked the neighborhood and the house, so we did not make a big deal about the road. In 2016 yellow flyers were placed on the doors all up and down the street in the entire neighborhood telling us that they would be resurfacing the road, and that we would need to park by the water tank. There was some activity that seemed to be starting, but then we did not see anybody. Nobody seemed to have an answer of*

*why we were scheduled and then nothing happened. It was odd that we were scheduled and then nothing materialized. I am not sure what happened, if there were funding issues or other things were more important, but we have not heard anything since then. The road is in such bad condition, my grandkids do not ride their bikes on the road, because they are going to wreck and get hurt. It is not a smooth surface and not level at all. Like everybody else in our neighborhood, we hope you will come out and look. I am sure it is affecting our property values. It is frustrating that we live in a neighborhood that our roads are in the shape that they are and it is frustrating to see the work being done on the next road over, with all of the culverts and driveways, and it is disheartening when we are just one street over and nothing has been done. Anything you can do would be appreciated.”*

**C. Consent Agenda**

It is recommended that the Mayor and Council instruct the Town Clerk to forward a recommendation to the Arizona Department of Liquor Licenses & Control Board to approve Liquor License Application #70054, Series #6 (Bar), Location and Owner Transfer to Jared M. Repinski, dba Munich Haus Grill & Beer Garden, located at 2044 E. White Mountain Boulevard, Pinetop AZ 85935.

Application #70054 is for a Liquor License Location and Owner Transfer, Series #6 - Bar (06090019). The applicant is Jared M. Repinski, dba Munich Haus Grill & Beer Garden, located at 2044 E. White Mountain Boulevard, Pinetop AZ 85935. Series #6, Bar License allows a bar retailer to sell and serve spirituous liquors, primarily by individual portions, to be consumed on the premises and in the original container for consumption on or off the premises.

As required by law, the Notice to the Public and a copy of the application were appropriately posted for 20 days. The twenty (20) days expired on August 5, 2019. The Town Clerk's Office did not receive any comments opposing or supporting the application.

The Police Department and Building Official has submitted favorable recommendation to approve the application.

The State Liquor License Application fee is \$100. The Town's Annual Business Transaction License is \$50.00 and per Resolution No. 06-823, a \$100.00 liquor license fee is due to the Town of Pinetop-Lakeside.

If the Council takes no action and fails to provide the State Liquor License Board with its order of approval or disapproval, as provided in A.R.S. 4-201, within 60 days of the application, the Board will proceed as though the Council had entered an order of approval.

By a unanimous vote under the Consent Agenda, Town Council authorized the Town Clerk to forward a favorable recommendation to the Arizona Department of Liquor Licenses and Control for issuance of Liquor License Location and Owner Transfer, Series #6 - Bar (06090019) to Jared M. Repinski, dba Munich Haus Grill Beer Garden, located at 2044 E. White Mountain Boulevard, Pinetop AZ 85935.



## **D. Business Before the Council**

Mayor Irwin announced that Public Comment will be taken at the beginning of each agenda item, after the subject has been announced by the Mayor and explained by Staff. Any citizen, who wishes, may speak one time for five minutes on each agenda item before or after Council discussion. Questions from Council Members, however, may be directed to staff or a member of the public through the Mayor at any time.

### **C.1 Approval of the Minutes of the Town Council Emergency Meeting held on August 2, 2019**

---

Mayor Irwin said this will give Director Matt Patterson the opportunity to give us an update on the action being taken and also have an update from the engineers. She said that Mark Woodson and Grant Evans, Woodson Engineering and Surveying, will explain what is happening in the neighborhoods affected by the storm.

Director Matt Patterson stated that he asked the engineers to provide an update on the situation. He explained that three different crews have been hired and are onsite and brought on board to help clean out all of the ditches, which our small staff would not be able to accomplish. At the same time, the Town engineer, Woodson Engineering and Surveying, was brought in to make sure that what we are putting back would meet engineering standards. Even though we are moving forward with the cleaning of the ditches, at the same time we want to make sure that all of the flow rates are correct, all of the culverts are correct and make sure it is all put back to what it was originally. We have been able to find quite a few of the plans, but a few sections from the lower section of Top of the Woods are missing.

Mark Woodson stated that Mr. Patterson called him Friday morning after the event and that they were onsite the following Monday morning. He said that he and Grant Evans walked the numerous sites with Mr. Patterson to look at the damage that had been done. In approximately forty-five minutes there was roughly 4.7 inches of rain and NOAA states from this particular latitude and longitude for Pinetop Arizona this qualifies as a thousand-year event. This was a unique storm event and this does not even account for the hail. He said that Bill Bess from Navajo County walked the sites to see what help the county would be able to provide. He said they are looking at the culverts for the sizes that are in the ground and what should be in the ground and said they are also going through the old

plans to review the original designs. He said it was not even built to the original designs. Why that happened thirty years ago, they do not know. They are now doing a lot of things to at least bring it up to that standard. He said they have to work within the existing right-of-way's and easements, which have constraints. He said they are working first on Top of the Woods, but he said there are three different water sheds defined and we are looking at all of those on how we can help and get the immediate concerns taken care of and then the long-range plans.

Director Patterson added that Navajo County and the City of Show Low have loaned trucks and workers to help with the clean-up. He said they are doing the best they can to get the area cleaned up as fast as possible.

Mayor Irwin commended Director Patterson and his staff for all of their hard work.

Manager Keith Johnson understands the concerns of the citizens and said it is not identified as a budgeted item, our goal is to address Pine Spruce in this current budget year. He said the Town is now working on the drainage issues first. He stated that the Town declared the storm event an emergency which will hopefully enable us to receive some help from Navajo County and the State of Arizona. The Town has applied with the State of Arizona for help with emergency funds. Currently funds are being spent from the "streets funds" and if we do not receive funds from the State this will impact the road projects already scheduled in this budget year. These documents have been submitted, a tour of the area will be done and the work being done will be reviewed. Hopefully we will receive reimbursement from the State and the most we can receive is \$200,000.00. If we can get that amount fed back into the budget, it will enable us to continue with the work that is scheduled during this fiscal year.

**D.2 Update Regarding the Operation of the Town's Collection Center**

Director Patterson provided the following update on the Collection Center that opened in June 2019:

- One ton of plastic hauled to Phoenix.
- Hauled two loads of cardboard and paper to the Pinetop Sanitary District.
- Hauled two loads of solid waste to Blue Hills.
- Solid waste brought in \$3,336.55 in July, tipping fees were \$742.00, generated a positive of \$2,594.55.
- Green Waste is very popular and was moved into a 40 yard can. Green waste brought in \$836.50 and the tipping fees have not been received yet.
- Recycling brought in \$1,419.675 with a positive of \$124.00.
- Took in appliances, electronics, tires and batteries for \$645.75 with no charge to dispose of.
- Grand total of \$6,238.55 brought in with tipping fees of \$618.00. After salaries and the loan payment there is a net loss of \$755.97.

Director Patterson said he is very happy with the numbers at this point. It was costing the Town \$30,000.00 a year to clean the Town and take the trash out, and this has been reduced by \$20,000.00 a year. Also, the parks department was losing two to three employees for hauling recycle two days a week and now they are not pulled from taking care of the parks.

**Public Hearing  
Resolution No. 19-1520  
Adoption of the Final Budget for the  
Town of Pinetop-Lakeside for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2020**

Conduct a public hearing for FY2019-2020 Budget and Consider Resolution No. 19-1518, adopting the Final Budget for the Town of Pinetop-Lakeside for the

Fiscal Year 2019-2020 in the amount of \$14,146,552.

On July 30, 2019 the Mayor and Council adopted the tentative budget for FY2019-2020, and set the public hearing for the budget and expenditure limitation for August 15, 2019. As required by statute that budget was published twice in the local paper and a public hearing is scheduled tonight as part of the regular council meeting.

The final budget of \$14,146,552 has not changed from the adopted tentative budget. The final budget represents all information that has been presented to the Council to date. Approval of this resolution will adopt the final budget for the Town of Pinetop-Lakeside for the year ending June 30, 2020.

Adoption of the Budget establishes the spending plan for the following fiscal year. No expenditure of funds may take place that is not in conformance with the adopted budget.

*Mayor Irwin called for public hearing to allow comments on this matter.*

*There being no comments, Mayor Irwin declared the public hearing closed.*

**DISCUSSION**

Finance Director Rodolph stated that the tentative budget was adopted by the Town Council on July 30 2019, in the amount of \$14,146.552.00 In Arizona, once the tentative budget is adopted that figure cannot be increased or changes made to the final budget, that it can be decreased but not increased. There have not been any changes made to the tentative budget adopted on July 30, 2019. He said the Council is being asked to adopt the final budget in the amount of \$14,146.552.00.

**Resolution No. 19-1519**

**Renewal of Town Manager's Employment Agreement**

At the direction of the Mayor and Council the Town Attorney negotiated a new employment agreement and recommends approval of the renewal of the Town Manager's Employment Agreement for a three (3) year period.

On July 7, 2016, the Town Council entered into an employment agreement with Keith W. Johnson as Town Manager for a three-year period expiring July 13, 2019. The Town Manager's employment is governed by an agreement between the Town Council and the Town Manager, as well as the Town Code.

The renewal agreement includes the following changes:

- Section 1: Term - Extend the agreement for three (3) year period commencing effective July 13, 2019 and expiring July 12, 2022.
- Section 3: Compensation - Update to reflect current salary which is \$95,790.00.
- Section 5: Automobile Allowance - Increase to \$500 per month.
- Section 13: Severance - If the Manager is terminated without cause at a time when the Manager is willing and able to perform his duties, the Town agrees to pay a lump sum cash payment equal to six (6) months' base salary at the then current rate of pay.
- All other provisions of the Former Employment Agreement shall remain as agreed upon on July 7, 2016, unless expressly revised or addressed hereinafter. Any inconsistencies between the New Employment Agreement

and the Former Employment Agreement shall be controlled by the provisions of the New Employment Agreement.

There is an anticipated additional cost of \$2,400 annually for Auto Allowance.

D.5 Report from Council Committee Liaison

Council Member Hastings reported on the following three non-profits that she is the liaison:

- Historical Society has an event on Saturday, August 17, 2019 and they will have a table set-up at Pinetop-Lakeside Days. The annual milk can fundraiser dinner will also be held on August 17<sup>th</sup>.
- White Mountain Humane Society Happy Tails event will be held on Saturday, August 24, 2019 at The Orchard from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Councilmember members serve lunch at the Senior Center once a month.

Council Member Snitzer reported on the following:

- TRACKS trail work continues. Membership is well over 500 members and they volunteer at events all over the mountain.
- Firewise report was just sent out and it is a requirement for Firewise communities to hold a review once a year.
- Chamber Commerce and the Town are working on doing some events together.
- Rainbow Lake group continues to put carp in Rainbow Lake and will be doing survey regarding the number of weeds remaining in the lake.

Council Member Dahnk reported on the following:

- The White Mountain Nature Center Wildlife festival will be held on August 31, 2019 and the Annual Benefit Fundraising Dinner will be held on September 14, 2019 at Hon-Dah.
- The Discovery Learning Camp is finished and plans are being made regarding the age groups for next year's camp; 3-4 years old, 5-6 years old and 7-8 years old.
- Rural Policy Forum on economic development and tourism for smaller, rural communities was held in the Springerville at the high school.

Council Member Bowen reported on the following:

- Blue Ridge School Board will be dedicating the football stadium to Paul Morro on Friday, August 23, 2019, during the first football game of the season.
- Eighth grade algebra has a 100% passing rate. The Arizona merit results for the schools are at C level.
- Shortfall of four hundred to eight hundred thousand dollars at the district due to the loss of 120 to 150 students this year.

Council Member Krigbaum reported on the following:

- TRACKS Up the Hill Gang had thirty-four people at one hike and thirty people for the hike at Mt. Baldy.

- The next 4FRI meeting will be held at the Game and Fish Department on Wednesday, August 28, 2019.
- The Natural Resource Working group did not meet in July.
- Save our Park has hired a group from Phoenix to help with fundraising to raise funds to buy the park.
